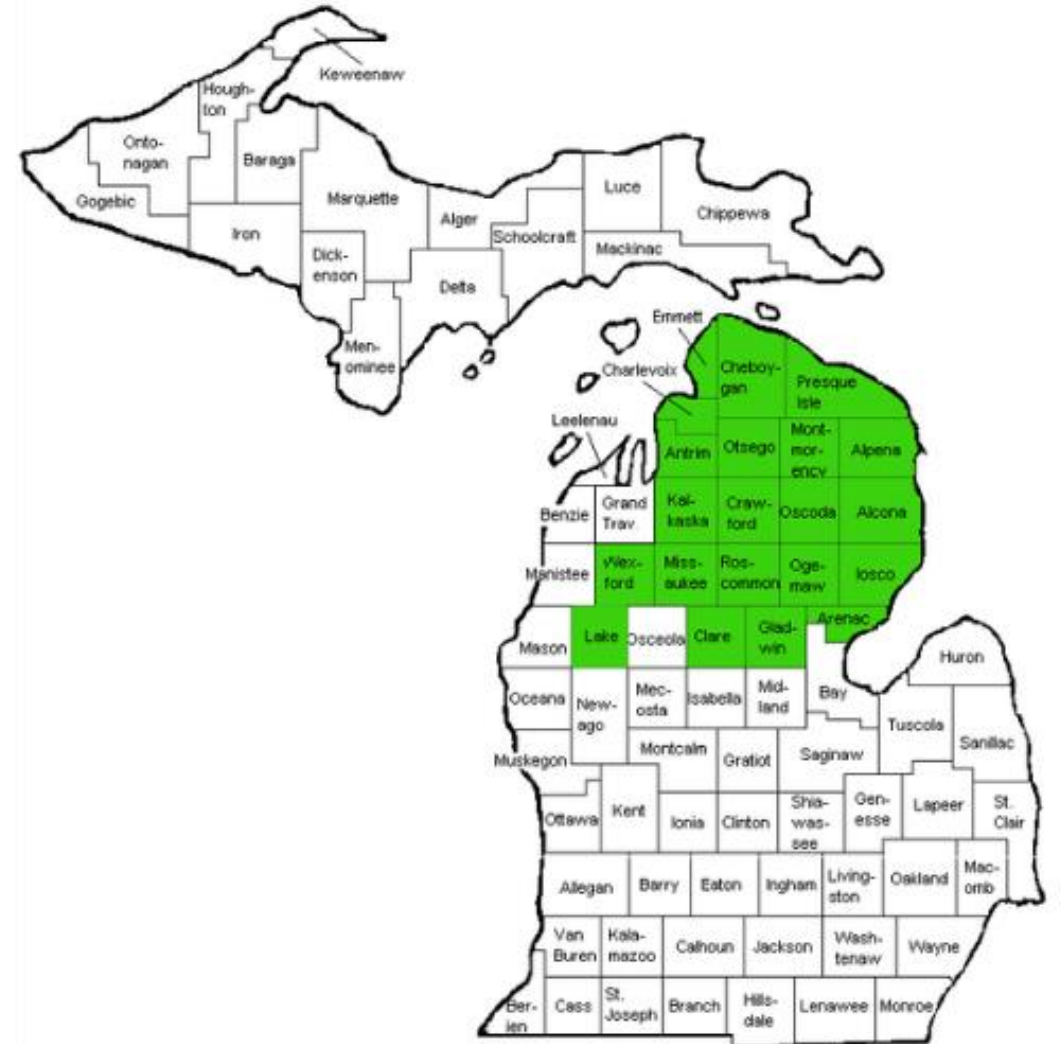

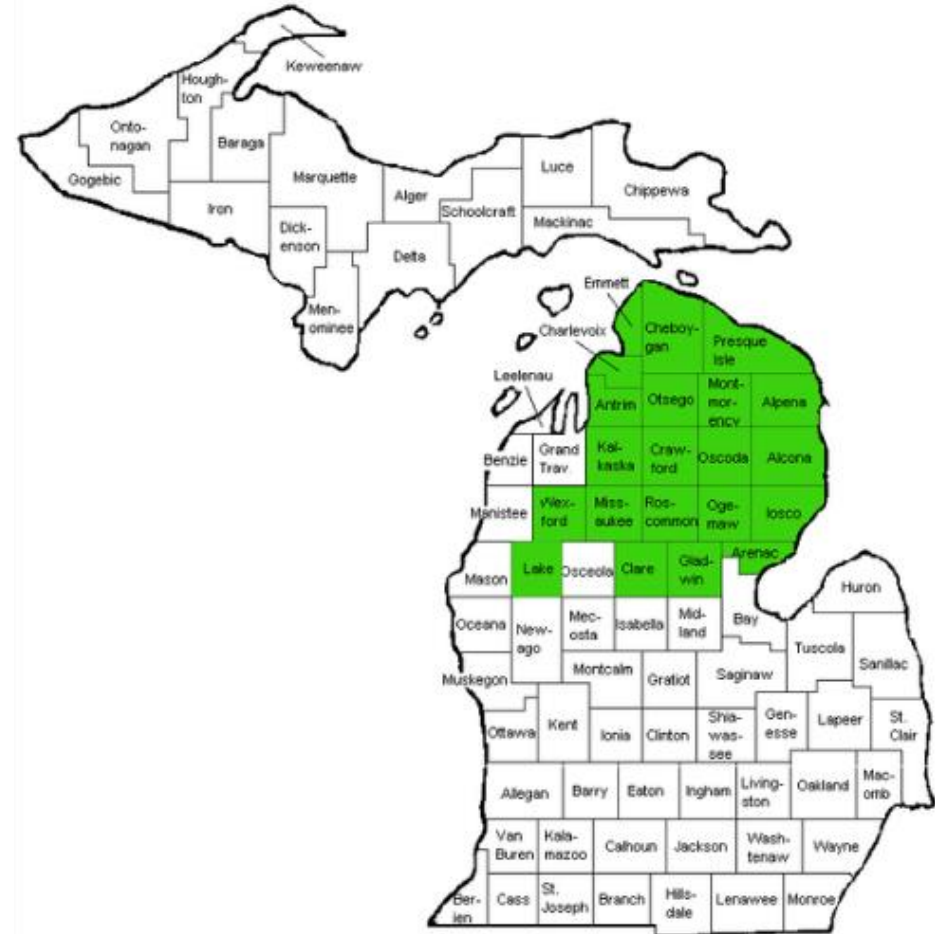
Funding

- ▶ HRSA RCORP Implementation I, II, III aims to strengthen and expand substance use disorder (SUD), including opioid use disorder (OUD) prevention, treatment, and recovery services in 21 Northern Michigan Counties
- ▶ HRSA RCORP Psychostimulant Support Program FY 21 aims to strengthen and expand prevention, treatment, and recovery services for individuals in rural areas who misuse psychostimulants; to enhance their ability to access treatment and move towards recovery.



NMORC Region

► The Northern Michigan Opioid Response Consortium (NMORC) is a 49-member Consortium addressing the opioid epidemic in a 21-county region including Alcona, Alpena, Antrim, Arenac, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Clare, Crawford, Emmet, Gladwin, Iosco, Kalkaska, Lake, Missaukee, Montmorency, Ogemaw, Oscoda, Otsego, Presque Isle, Roscommon, and Wexford counties of rural Northern Michigan.



NMORC Mission

Mission: To engage Northern Michigan in a coordinated response to reduce substance use disorders.

Why focus on this 21-county region in Northern Michigan?

- ▶ The 21-county region prioritized for this project are rural areas and consistently ranked as the highest need in the State due to:
 - ▶ poor economic factors
 - ▶ poor health conditions
 - ▶ social and behavioral barriers
 - ▶ prescribing patterns
 - ▶ high prescription drug use
- ▶ All 21 counties have a high prevalence of SUD and OUD

NMORC Priority Areas

- ▶ The NMORC focuses on the following priority areas:
 - ▶ Prevention
 - ▶ Treatment
 - ▶ Recovery
 - ▶ Workforce

Saving Lives: Narcan

The Federal Food and Drug Administration announced on August 17, 2020 that the expiration date for

NARCAN® (naloxone HCl) NASAL SPRAY

has been extended from 24 to 36 months.

This extension applies to all NARCAN® kits in circulation.

- If you have a NARCAN® kit that has expired, it is viable for an additional 12 months from the stated expiration date.
- If you have a NARCAN® kit that hasn't expired, you may consider it viable for an additional 12 months from the stated expiration date.



Storage conditions for NARCAN® have also been updated. It should be kept in temperatures between 58°F and 77°F. NARCAN® freezes at temperatures below 5°F. If this happens, the device will not spray. Leave the device at room temperature for 15 minutes to thaw the medicine before use.

The expiration date extension applies only to NARCAN® nasal spray naloxone. It does not apply to any other formulation.

 - ▶ Emergency Departments: Project ASSERT, Home with Narcan
- ▶ Jails: Release with Narcan and access to MAT
- ▶ Other Ways to Get Narcan:
 - ▶ Harm Reduction sites, District Health Departments, Mail-Order free Narcan, Pharmacies
- ▶ Opioid Overdose Kits in Public Places: Libraries, Health Departments, Schools, Community Centers, Casinos
- ▶ Naloxone Vending Machines

FREE Naloxone

Naloxone, or Narcan, is a life-saving medication that can **reverse the effects of an opioid overdose**. Many community organizations offer free Naloxone and training to administer the medication.

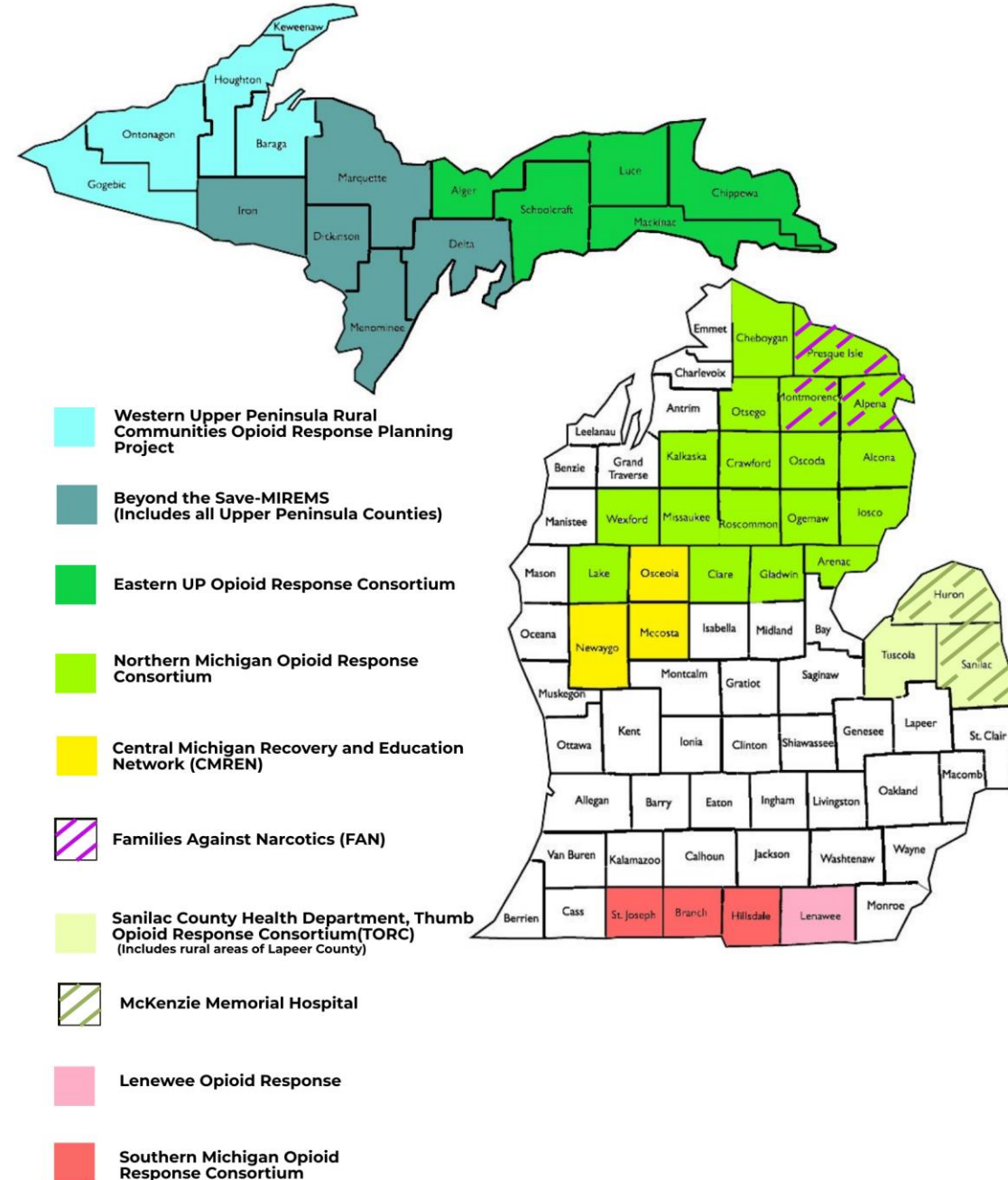
