




In a possible Governor's race, Gretchen Whitmer has a lead over Brian Calley, but nearly one-fourth of survey respondents are undecided.




Whitmer also has a lead over Bill Schuette, although it's smaller than her lead over Brian Calley. Once again, nearly a quarter of respondents are undecided.




A possible ballot initiative calling for a part-time legislature has a double-digit lead.



A possible ballot initiative calling for an end to gerrymandering leads by nearly two to one.



A possible ballot initiative calling for legalization of marijuana leads by 26 percentage points, with only five percent undecided.
