

The Michigan Public Policy Survey

- A census survey
 - all 1,856 Michigan counties, cities, villages, and townships
- Local government respondents –
 top elected and appointed officials
- Administered –
 online and via hardcopy
- Topics
 - examples include fiscal health, government operations and budget policies, elections, energy, roads, poverty, civic engagement, water infrastructure, employee policies and labor unions, housing, environmental sustainability, and much more.

MPPS is not a typical opinion poll



70%+ response rates

- Transparency
 - ~ Questionnaires online
 - ~ Pre-run data tables online
 - ~ Sharing of (anonymized) datasets with other researchers
- Research partnership with MAC, MML, MTA and others

How did the Spring 2025 wave shape up?


Responses from 1,328 Michigan local governments (72%)

- 72 counties (87%)
- 208 cities (74%)
- 162 villages (64%)
- 886 townships (71%)



How are local leaders feeling about their overall fiscal health today?

Statewide, concerns about local governments' fiscal stress are edging upward




Growing concerns about local governments' fiscal stress found in all jurisdiction types, particularly among village leaders


Small communities in general express the most concern about fiscal stress in 2025.



Are local leaders concerned about loss of federal and state funding?


Statewide, 40% believe the loss or pause of at least one type of federal or state funding source will be a problem for their jurisdiction's fiscal health.

"To what extent might the end (or pause) of any large federal or state funding programs pose a problem for your jurisdiction's fiscal health in the next five years?"



Over 70% of the state's largest jurisdictions believe loss of federal or state funding will be a problem for their jurisdiction's fiscal health.



Are local leaders concerned about loss of ARPA funding in particular?


Statewide, 24% of believe the end of ARPA funding will be a problem for their jurisdiction's fiscal health, including 36% of counties.

One-third of Michigan's **largest** jurisdictions predict the end of ARPA funding may cause somewhat or significant fiscal problems.



Who is planning ahead for the end of ARPA (and other federal funding)?


Fewer than half of officials from cities, villages, and townships statewide say they are preparing for the loss of funding. One in six are unsure.

"As far as you know, is your jurisdiction making plans or taking any specific actions to prepare for a potential loss of federal or state funds...?"




Less than half of jurisdictions where officials say end of **ARPA funding** will be a fiscal problem say they are preparing for the loss of funding.

However, most of the largest jurisdictions say they are preparing for the loss of funding.




Among places that are planning ahead for funding loss, where are they taking specific actions?

Some focused on water and sewer infrastructure and other capital improvements, two of the most commonly reported uses of ARPA funds

How are local leaders feeling about their fiscal health for the future?

Local leaders have become increasingly pessimistic about maintaining service provision under of Michigan's current system of taxation and revenue sharing.



"Thinking about the revenue caps facing your jurisdiction (for example, the Headlee Amendment, Proposal A, etc.), do you agree or disagree that Michigan's current system of funding local government will provide adequate funding to maintain the current quantity and quality of services your jurisdiction provides?"
